



At Bay Quarter, enjoy the variety of restaurants, cafes, shops and even a performance at the outdoor stage if you want. Admire the portside vista before it's filled with more skyscraping mansions.

Take the walk that leads to SOGO. At SOGO follow the walkway left and cross the Hamamirai Walk to Nissan Global HQ. First mandatory pit stop. Head down into their flagship showroom for the latest and greatest offerings from the automaker. Sit in a Skyline GT, or the try the 3D simulator. Free.

This is where we're going to lose some people. Queen's Square offers big-time shopping, eating drinking and street entertainers. Or you could sneak off for a matinee at Brilliya Short Shorts Theater while the shopaholics do their thing.

Walk across the park to visit Aka Renga Soko (Red Brick Warehouse) and its surrounding waterfront park. The converted warehouses are home to a variety of shops, restaurants and cultural facilities. The large plaza between the two buildings hosts festivals just about every weekend from spring through autumn. Take the Shinkobashi Bridge, walk around to Zou no Hana Park and make your way to the Yokohama International Passenger Terminal.

Walk past the ferries docked here and head out on the amazing wood and grass deck of Osanbashi Pier. If you've timed it right, get a cocktail from the SubZero Bar on the deck for a sundowner and an unforgettable view of the Yokohama skyline.

Start your engines. From North East Exit A, take the stairs up to the Bay Quarter Walk and stay on the left. Savor the sunny saunter as you to head to Yokohama Bay Quarter and its waterfront vantage point.

Outside Nissan HQ, resume on the upper walkway and take the Minato Mirai Deck over the intersection. From here, fill your soccer boots at Marinos Town where the Yokohama F-Marinos practice, rock out with your J-pop out at Yokohama Blitz, or get a coffee at Blenz and join the party at one of the many weddings taking place at the wedding halls.

Yokohama Museum of Art. Culture pit stop. See local and international artworks from the likes of Picasso, Dalí, Matisse plus this summer's Yokohama Triennale.

Jackpot. The Yokohama Landmark Tower is still the tallest building in Japan (with the highest observation deck) and the Nippon Maru Memorial Park offers loads to explore. Cosmo World has mini rollercoasters and an ice room (no vodka). Now head across the promenade that cuts through the water to get to the big kids' rides.

Go around the wedding hall, the after another up & over, you're on the Grand Mall Park. Rev it up or just stroll. Put it in idle at the Tsutaya that lets you read books off the shelf if you purchase a Starbucks coffee. Or not...

At Canal Park, break left for the Cosmo Clock Ferris Wheel and the water plunging rollercoaster. Get international at Yokohama World Porters—take in a real movie at Warner MyCal or just grab a few cans of world beer for the next leg. Rooftop golfing, anyone?

Head back over to Aka Renga Pier and relax on the Seabass waterbus along the ocean edge of Shinko park and back to Yokohama station. If you miss the Seabass, head back along the promenade to Sakuragicho or Minato Mirai stations.
